

LESSONS OF HISTORY

Why history? What's the point? The job market today is dominated with concepts like *applicable skills* and *hireability*? These terms make the pursuit of history and historical truth - trivial.

As a history teacher, it's a question I know many students I teach, have. In all candor, it's a question I myself entertained when I studied history as a student.

When I worked up the courage to ask my history teacher this question a few years back, she gave me a clichéd response – *Those who don't know history are doomed to repeat it*. I admit I didn't fully understand her explanation then, but I feel I do understand it now.

In the last few months, we've seen artificial intelligence disrupt the tech sector – automating repetitive tasks and making many jobs obsolete. Tech magnates have casually floated the notion of sentient AIs that will have capabilities to overwhelm the most sophisticated man-made security infrastructure.

In this time of limitless technological transformation, what role does history have to play?

More than eighty years ago, a group of scientists were on the verge of a similar technological and scientific breakthrough. They had willed into existence a weapon that would be capable of turning entire cities into dust within seconds. The weapon they built was the atomic bomb, and the man heading that team was J Robert Oppenhiemer.

Oppenhiemer was a genius, but he naively believed he could dictate the use of his creation. With AI in the fold, the tech sector now faces its *Oppenhiemer* moment. Students scribbling in notebooks today will shape the future of technology. The tale of Dr Oppenhiemer, while inspiring in its ingenuity, also has lessons for innovators of tomorrow. Naivety can be costly in the pursuit of growth.
